In order for Carol to know how much insulin she needs, she - first - has to check the level of glucose in her blood.



She draws a tiny drop of blood, from the tip of her finger, and puts the drop in a small device.



Then, she waits a few seconds, for a number to come up on the screen. That number tells her how much glucose there is in her blood.



She has to have glucose checks several times a day, because it's not good to have too much glucose, or too little!



That's why most of Carol's friends, often, see her use the glucose measuring device, at school!
